Christmas Play 2000

The basic idea is to have the inn as the central focus. The play will start in a pub in modern time on Christmas Eve, and shift by sleight of hand into the inn 2000 years ago. After the nativity the scene will finally shift back to modern time.

- Narrator 1 We would like to take you back to Christmas Eve
- Narrator 2 People have finished their work for the year, and they are thinking about the Christmas holiday
- Narrator 1 We now meet the landlord of the Eagle public house and his wife, getting ready for the Christmas Eve rush
- Narrator 2 This is not an ordinary Christmas Eve. Come with us to find out what happens.

Scene 1: Modern pub on Christmas Eve

- Landlord Scene begins in the pub with landlord and landlady getting ready for opening (Turns from arranging bar to talk to audience) Good evening everyone, and welcome to my pub. (Points to sign) You see it's called the Eagle. It is Christmas Eve, and shortly we will open. Tonight is my busiest night of the year, well, apart from New Year's Eve. Lots of people will come in, some on their way home from work, some to get away from their homes, some to just let off steam. For whatever reason they come, I can tell you that it means I make a lot of money out of tonight. And tomorrow will be busy as well. Just as soon as they get in, those tills will be ringing.
- Landlady (*Turns from her work and speaks to Landlord*) And I'm the Landlady, and unless you stop talking and open up we aren't going to get any punters, and you are not going to take any money!
- Landlord Okay, okay (Goes to open doors, calls to people) We're open now. Few people come in, some go to tables, and some order drinks. Main focus switches to small group sitting round table.
- Person 1 Well, that's it for another year.
- Person 2 What have you been doing this week?
- Person 3 Tax forms. They have to sent in next month, and everyone leaves them to the last minute.
- Person 4 I've had more than usual this year. Glad to see the back of them now.
- Person 1 They ought to just ship everyone off to a hotel next to the tax office for a few days each year, then they can fill the wretched forms in together, and we can be have rid of them for a year.
- Person 2 It's probably been tried in the past!
- Landlady (Brings drinks over) Here you are. You look as if you need these!
- All People Thanks
- Landlady Any plans for Christmas?
- Person 3 Just a quiet time at home with the family.
- Person 4 I have to drive to my parents tonight.
- Person 2 I'm planning on sitting down watching the TV. My husband can do the cooking this Christmas.
- Person 3 So what do you think of Christmas then?
- Person 1 It always seems to be such a rush. Never any time to think about it.
- Person 4 My daughter was in a play this year, all about Mary and Joseph and the baby Jesus. Joseph and Mary arrive and join the people at the table
- Person 3 Hello, come and bring up a chair
- Person 4 Landlord, can we have a couple of drinks over here please? (*Landlord brings drinks over during following dialogue*)
- Joseph Thanks. How are you all?
- Person 1 Glad that we have finished work for the year. But how are you?

	Bar staff rush around serving people, organised by landlord. Two staff come to front	
Staff 1	We are really rushed tonight. Is it always like this on Christmas Eve?	
Staff 2	Always.	
Landlady	(to the two waiters) Can you take these to those two gentlemen over there	
Both Staff	(Both) Okay	
	Take glasses to the vicar and curate.	
Landlady	I have never seen it this busy at Christmas. New Year, yes, but never before on Christmas	
	Eve. Are you all coping okay. (Staff people come back to centre)	
Staff 1	We are busy,	
Staff 2	But we're coping	
Landlady	We'll all be glad of the rest tomorrow!	
Staff 1	You bet!	
Staff 2	Right on!	
Landlady	People seem to be enjoying themselves. I wonder how they will all spend Christmas day	
Staff 1	Asleep perhaps!	
Landlady	It's funny to think that the first Christmas started in an inn like ours.	
Staff 2	Do you think it was just as busy?	
Landlady	I don't know. Probably.	
Landlord	(Appears from back) A song, a song, time for a Christmas song. Have we got a pianist?	
	Good, Everyone ready	
	Everyone stands together to sing "God rest you merry gentlemen". Congregation joins in.	
	At the end most people move off.	

Scene 3: Same pub, but now it becomes ambiguous what period of time it is

- Narrator 1 Christmas Eve is often the time for people to go to their families
- Narrator 2 Some people are keener than others these people are not in any hurry
- Narrator 1 Other people have to travel on Christmas Eve
- Narrator 2 We are now going to meet some people on a journey

Few people still drinking at the table, served by landlord and landlady. Kings enter wearing coats, and disrobe to reveal kingly clothes. They sit down and are served drinks You are strange to these parts?

Traveller 1 We've come a long way

Innkeeper

- Traveller 2 And we hope we don't have much further to go
- Traveller 3 But it's nice to sit down and have a drink.
- Traveller 4 Any chance of a room for us for the night.

Wife (Blows a sigh) No chance I'm afraid. I doubt if you'll find anywhere tonight.

- Innkeeper The town is full tonight, and has been for a few days. The Romans have forced them all to come here to sort out their taxes.
- Wife If you want, there is a stable round the back you can stay in. Your camels will be able to

	rest, and it ought to be comfortable.		
Traveller 1	That sounds fine – better than some of the places we have stayed in.		
Wife	Where are you heading anyway?		
Traveller 2	We don't know. We are just following a star in the sky		
Wife	Any particular star?		
Traveller 3	Yes, there is one that came from the East and is travelling in this direction		
Traveller 4	Once we saw it we know it was something special. When we looked at our scrolls we		
The other t	discovered that it meant that a new king is to be born.		
Traveller 1	So we have come to worship him		
Traveller 2	And the star seems to have come to rest over this town. Once we have had a drink, we will		
	go to look for this new king.		
Innkeeper	(to his wife, gesturing that he thinks they are crazy) Do you think they're okay?		
Wife	They seem okay. Goodness knows what they are going on about. (<i>To travellers</i>) There's		
	no king here in Bethlehem. In fact nothing here at all. Have another drink and then I'll		
	show you the stable.		
	Group on other table overhear, one turns to talk to the travellers		
Person 1	We couldn't help but overhear.		
Person 2	Sounds exciting, following a star		
Person 3	How long have you been travelling		
Traveller 3			
Traveller 4	Two or three months now. It's easy to lose count! You don't know where a new king might have been born?		
Person 1	Not here for sure.		
Person 2	Have you tried Jerusalem?		
Traveller 1	Where's Jerusalem?		
Person 3	Just a few miles down the road.		
Person 1	King Herod lives there. I didn't know that he is having a son.		
Traveller 2	But the star says that it is this town.		
Person 2	I doubt it. But people in Jerusalem would know.		
Traveller 3	How come?		
Person 3	There are a lot of smart people in Jerusalem. They ought to know.		
Person 1	They will tell you where the new king is to be born.		
Traveller 4	Perhaps we should try Jerusalem.		
Traveller 1	Come on, let's go

Narrator 1	Our travellers have set off to look for the King		
Narrator 2	But other people still have to work. They are having a last drink before the innkeeper		
	locks up for the night		
Narrator 1	It is not going to be quite as quiet as the innkeeper and his wife are hoping		

Narrator 2 Someone else is about to arrive

- Shepherd 1 Yes, we will to go off to the fields shortly.
- Innkeeper Are we almost ready to call it a night

Innkeeper	Yes, it will be okay for them. Pity we don't have a proper room though.		
Shepherd 3	Better than we will have.		
Shepherd 4	Yes, tonight we sleep under the stars looking after the sheep.		
Shepherd 1	At least we can look for the star those strangers thought they were following.

Innkeeper	What a strange night. Here we are, really busy with the taxing business, then come those		
	strange people following a star, and then Mary and Joseph.		
Wife	I think that we are going to have to keep an eye on them. They are so young and on their		
	own. You lock up. I'll go and check that they are okay.		
Narrator 1	The birth of Jesus at Christmas was foretold by many of God's prophets		
Narrator 2	The message of Christmas is good news. God has come to His people		
Song	God has spoken to His people		
Scene 5:	Later		
W/:£-	Landlord is tidying up. Suddenly in rushes Landlady		
Wife	Quick! Quick! The baby is coming. Quick, I need some water. Is there any hot water on		
T 1	the fire? And cloths to wrap the baby in.		

- Innkeeper You go back. I'll get the things. Wait. Shouldn't we try to move them into one of the other rooms. We can kick someone out. They will understand.
- Wife There's no time for that. Besides, they are probably better off staying in one place now. It may not be perfect, but they seem comfortable enough.
- Innkeeper Okay, you get back and I'll bring the things round.

Scene 6: Shepherds in fields (follows without a break, based in the aisle)

Shepherds blow whistles from around the church, and then start calling. Move to middle of aisle

- Shepherd 1 All's well so far
- Shepherd 2 The sheep seem safe enough
- Shepherd 1 Have you seen the star that those people were talking about
- Shepherd 3 I think that it is that one over there
- Shepherd 4 Whereabouts?
- Shepherd 1 Look, over there! (all strain to look) What's that light over there? Angels run in and onto the stage, shepherds fall to floor
- Angel 1 Don't be afraid. Come closer
- Angel 2 We have good news for you of great joy, for you and all people Shepherds move closer
- Angel 3 Tonight in Bethlehem a child has been born
- Angel 1 He is the Saviour, He is Christ, the Lord
- Angel 2 Go to Bethlehem and worship Him,
- Angel 3 And this is how you will know Him. He will be wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger
- Angel 4 Glory to God in the Highest
- Angel 5 And peace to people on Earth who are loved by God
- Angel 1 Go quickly and you will find Him
 - Angels move off. Shepherds stand up and rub their eyes
- Shepherd 1 Did we really see that?
- Shepherd 2 Yes, and we should do what they say
- Shepherd 3 To Bethlehem
- All shepherds To Bethlehem!

Song Tonight

- Narrator 1 The shepherds now rush towards Bethlehem
- Narrator 2 The baby Jesus is now resting, and the innkeeper and his wife are getting ready for bed

Scene 7: Back to the inn

Innkeeper tidying up. His wife appears Wife What an amazing night Innkeeper How are they doing Wife They're fine. They are resting now. Shepherds knock at door Innkeeper Who do you think this is now?
