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**James writes ...  
Joyful Celebration or Living with Uncertainty?**

This year Advent and Christmas is going to be like no other. Yes, the spiritual meaning of this special season, as always, is about waiting and watching – as we wait with the pregnant Mary, as we look to the visions of the prophets, and for new life to dawn in our world.

But in 2020 - supposed to be a milestone: remember ‘2020 vision’ - everything has been turned upside down by our global Covid-19 pandemic. The first lock-down was hard enough, but at the time of writing we are mid-way through a second lock-down, and even now we don’t know whether or not gathered Church will be possible during Advent as a whole. Hence, later in Parish Voice, we outline our expected pattern of services – a combination of gathered and online worship – not yet knowing what will be permissible. After all, we’d planned lots of

things during November – including my institution as vicar of St John’s by the Bishop of Ely – which mostly had to be cancelled. So the world is not ‘as we know it’, and above all people are suffering under the pandemic: rising cases of Covid-19, hospital admissions, mental ill health, delays to other treatments, and widespread economic and social disruption, all around the world. How much prayer is needed, at times like this.

What can we learn from this time, as we still anticipate – with hope and expectation – our joyful celebration together, of the birth of the Messiah, our Lord Jesus Christ?

In November our Church leaders nationally, in response to another lock-down, announced a ‘month of prayer’, recalling us to our fundamental spiritual disciplines. Times of desolation, as I suggested on 15<sup>th</sup> November, do enable us to be ‘hollowed out’, so that we may be filled once more with the things of God. It’s painful, but growth can still happen, if ‘we are still’. We do not seek such hardship and uncertainty, but this is a time of prayerful growth, as we rely more wholly on God’s presence and support for our lives. And may this continue, throughout Advent, Christmas & Epiphany.

Secondly, our resilience and creativity, as a Christian community, during the pandemic as a whole, has shown us that there is much more than we can still do – lock-down or no lock-down – to continue our collective worship, liturgical creativity, teaching and witnessing, in uncertain times. It was profound to notice how many people were impacted by our Remembrance Sunday ‘Roll of Honour’, recorded by St John’s Choir and Michael Fincham, fortuitously, prior to lock-down! In the same way, lots is planned for December, including Carol Services both pre-recorded and live-streamed, as well as a pre-recorded online Nativity, and options for Christingle either gathered or on Zoom! Many Churches, whatever the challenges, are experiencing unexpected growth, via their online provision, and people’s hunger for the spiritual.

Thirdly, throughout 2020 we have been led to affirm, appreciate and support the work of our wonderful NHS and frontline workers, as well as scientists, and leaders in national and local government, as so many take a lead in keeping us all safe, and supporting the vulnerable. And how

exciting and hope-filled the recent news of potential Covid-19 vaccines, which will make such a difference, as we dream of a 'new normal' in 2021, including being reunited with so many loved ones whom we haven't been able to spend time with! All of us have a duty to support each other, and the most vulnerable, as at present through our telephone contact scheme and local Food-Hub, and may we all support our NHS staff. I am very proud to be a very small part of that, as I continue my Locum Chaplaincy role at Addenbrooke's during this lock-down. May all doctors, nurses, scientists, as well as school-teachers in our congregation, know that we are with them in spirit.

Fourthly, as we prepare to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace, Emmanuel, who makes all things new, and helps usher in a 'new creation' of which the Bible speaks ('New heavens and a new earth'), we all have a duty – anticipating our world, post-pandemic – to explore ways of living more compassionately, justly and sustainably, into God's future. That's why I'm pleased St John's is going to continue its engagement with issues of ecology sustainability, into 2021, as well as supporting people of good will in envisioning a new and more just future. Let us all pray that our world and its leaders will indeed begin to address these urgent needs of our planet and all living creatures.

Please enjoy this edition, and I especially invite you to engage with the series of weekly spiritual reflections – prepared by our ordinands and ministry team - and associated materials on our St John's website, including links to the Church of England's 'Comfort and Joy' reflections, over nine days of the Christmas festival.

## Introducing Our New Curate



Hi, I'm Ceri Payne and I'm looking forward to meeting you as your Curate from next summer. I've lived on Hills Road near St John's for nearly 20 years, together with my husband Mike who is a professor of computational physics at the Cavendish Lab and a fellow at Pembroke College, and our four children. They are now all grown up and we also have a son-in-law.

I originally came to Cambridge from a little village in East Yorkshire to study law at Girton College. On my first Sunday in Cambridge I went to

church only out of curiosity after the girl in the room next to mine asked if I'd like to go with her. I dipped in and out of church for the next few years, but my interest was re-kindled when I was living in London whilst training to be a barrister. I met some friends who expected God to care about their lives and their prayers and I saw what it meant to them to have a personal relationship with God.

Over many months I grew to understand more about God through the Bible and when I realised how relationship with him becomes

possible through Jesus, I knew that I had become a Christian. After that, everything felt different. When Mike returned to Cambridge after a year of research at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he also started looking into Christianity and he has his own story to tell about how God became a reality to him.

We got married and lived in Sleaford Street and then in Gwydir Street, and we moved to Hills Road after 15 years. In normal times, we love being within a short walk of the cinema so we can satisfy our eclectic tastes in films.

I was a barrister in chambers in London for more than 30 years and I was a QC for my last 7 years in practice (as Ceri Bryant QC). I loved working in company law advising all kinds of companies, big and small. I've always enjoyed problem-solving so I relished the challenge of using our Victorian, but very flexible, company-restructuring legislation to achieve complex reorganisations, and then proving to the judge that these they would be fair to all the stakeholders (or occasionally seeking to persuade the judge that the opposition's proposals were nothing but a travesty of justice!). But throughout my working life I was also excited about showing from the Bible


and from experience how God reaches out to us through Jesus.

Thinking about how far to press on with becoming a judge myself, I came to realise that it was my conversations with people about God that were becoming the most important to me because they were of potentially eternal significance. I loved my legal work, but I started to explore working with the church full-time, and that is how I came to be at theological college in Ridley Hall and to be looking forward to starting as your Curate.

Theological college has been a wonderful opportunity to engage with Christians with very different experience and perspectives and to grow and learn together. Since I'm doing a Cambridge University theology degree, I'm also an undergraduate at Magdalene College and I've enjoyed becoming part of Magdalene's chapel community. Being on Magdalene's team on University Challenge has also been enormous fun.


I'm very excited about everything God is going to show me whilst learning with James and with you, as your Curate.

## Ordinand Will's successful charity run for Westcott House

It was a cold morning one day in January, and I was enjoying breakfast in the Dining Hall with Bishop Tim Stevens. He had just the previous day arrived as our Interim Acting Principal of my theological college, Westcott House. We were talking about our hobbies and interests – and upon telling him I'm a keen runner, he jokingly said I should run a charity run for Westcott House.

I loved the idea – and so I did!

I was intending to run a race in London's glorious Richmond Park later that term, but the race was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. However, this did not deter me – and after the summer vacation I successfully entered a 10k race in the stunning Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, near Stratford.

Through my charity running, I've raised over £18,000 for charity so far – including charities such as the British Heart Foundation, Cancer Research UK, Crohn's & Colitis UK, and now of course for Westcott House.

The race was a huge success – it was my first race since the first lockdown, and it felt wonderful to be running competitively again, in the autumnal sunshine of October. I completed the 10k in 41:46, and I came 67<sup>th</sup> out of 294 runners. And, to my delight, I raised £1,278 for Westcott House – and to Bishop Tim's delight as well, of course!

We still have Advent Calendars with and without chocolate, Christmas Cards, wrapping paper, seasonal gifts, Christmas chocolates and biscuits, as well as the usual range of groceries and household products. If we are still in lockdown I will move all the stock to my house and shall be happy to serve you from my front doorstep. Or phone me and I'll deliver to you.

This season always brings much packaging waste but thankfully many companies are replacing plastic with compostable material. Traidcraft uses sustainable packaging, with the likes of the inner wrap of its chocolate bars and its sweets' packaging coming in compostable material. It's important that these are added to your compost waste and not to the recycling bins otherwise they will contaminate the whole load. There are many products in the catalogue made with recycled glass as well as innovative household products such as bar shampoo which uses no plastic at all. Remember that only if it passes the scrunch test can simple wrapping be recycled (without the sticky tape) but foil or glitter decorated paper cannot and should go in the general waste.

Thank you to everyone for your support. There won't be a January stall but we hope to see you again on Sunday 7 February. In the meantime, don't forget that the goods in my house will be accessible if anyone has need of anything.

What follows is a guide to which services we hope to run over Advent and Christmas. Obviously, all of these are provisional on any further COVID-19 restrictions being put into place.

All our main Advent and Christmas services will need to be booked, via Eventbrite. Details of this will be on the website and contained in the weekly e-news. Please do contact James or Chris if you have any difficulties booking in this way.

In the first instance, due to restrictions on numbers, we ask everyone to only book to physically attend one out of the Carol Service/ Midnight Mass/ Christmas Day. In addition, we're asking families to only choose one out of Christingle and Messy Nativity. Obviously if we have 'spare seats' we can open these up more widely. Full details of how to access online services is also below.

## **Sunday, 13<sup>th</sup> December at 4:00 pm**

### **Christingle Service**

A service for all ages, during which we create a Christingle and celebrate Jesus as light of the world. Includes a collection in aid of The Children's Society. If possible, bring your own orange!

## **Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> December at 6:00 pm**

### **Christmas Carol Service**

A candlelit service of traditional Christmas music and readings. We expect there will no congregational singing.
